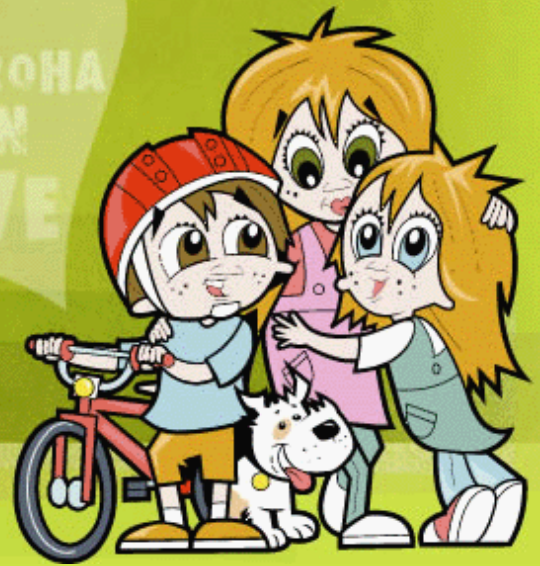

Draft Media Statement

Sunday, 1 March 2015 is Children's Day.

Children's Day is a time where families and communities come together to celebrate the children in their lives.

It's a day of fun, with lots of events planned up and down the country. But it's also something more than that.

Children are our treasure, and Children's Day is the perfect time for every one of us to stop and think about what we can do for the small people in our lives.

We grownups have the very important job of making sure children have all the things they need to thrive. That means lots of love, a warm, safe place to live, and an environment where they can grow into wonderful, confident young people.

One of the most important things we can do is give them our time. When asked what they most like to do on Children's Day, the young people we talked to said "doing fun stuff with my family".

Spending time, talking, and asking our children about their hopes and dreams doesn't cost a thing, but it sends a message that they're loved. It's also a chance for us to learn something new about them – children are full of wisdom and can tell us lots about the things they need to be happy.

On Sunday, 1 March 2015, our hope is that every family in New Zealand does something to treasure their children, and make a pact that children come first, this day and every day from this one forward.
